Tree Planting Day: A Great Day in Our Community

Neighborhood excitement ran high on Saturday, April 23 one of the few sunny days for the month — as 40+ volunteers gathered for our Tree Planting Day, sponsored by Openlands and GIPNA! The enthusiasm and hard work of neighbors, tree recipients, Girl Scouts, Murphy School students and parents, and GIPNA board members made the day extra fun, and the expertise and friendliness of the Openlands team added to the spirit of the event. State Senator Cristina H. Pacione-Zayas also stopped by and visited with participants.

A total of 35 trees were planted throughout the neighborhood, including a few on Friday at addresses a little further away. This will be a great boon for our community in years to come as these young trees mature, adding shade and beauty to our streets.

Assigned to different crews, volunteers fanned out into the nearby streets, led by Openlands apprentices. One group stayed at Murphy, which received six trees on its campus. The apprentices provided education about planting and caring for trees, then participants got to help with the planting process. Each tree was planted at a location where residents/owners have agreed to care for the young trees for three years by watering weekly during the growing season, and mulching twice a year.

A big thank-you to Murphy School and Dr. Zelenka for hospitality in allowing us to use the school as the central gathering location; to Penny Shultz, Murphy Garden Club sponsor, and the Garden Club participants, and to Murphy's PTO for providing coffee and donuts. And, of course, applause and appreciation to every volunteer who contributed to making the day a huge success!

Special appreciation to the Openlands team: Tom Ebeling, Community Arborist, for his support in coordinating our Tree Planters Grant; Al De Reu, neighborhood TreeKeeper extraordinaire, for looking out for the well-being of our trees, and to the whole Openlands team for loving trees and being enthusiastic supporters of getting trees planted in neighborhoods!

A Parkway **Dollhouse** for **All to Enjoy**







6 p.m. (Donations can be placed on the table under the pergola.) Veggies will be brought to the Food Pantry Wednesday morning for immediate distribution to Food Pantry clients.

How Are Ward Menu Monies Used?

In Chicago, aldermen receive a pot of money to use at their discretion. This is known as Aldermanic Menu Money. The funds between \$1.3 and \$1.5 million annually are generally for ward improvements that are not covered by the city's capital budget. Some wards use participatory budgeting (PB) in which neighbors vote on an array of projects put forth by those in the ward. This was the case for the 45th Ward with our previous alderman (Arena). It was easy to determine how these monies were spent because after the votes were tallied, the winners were announced and funded in the next year's budget.

Some critics of participatory budgeting claimed that it was a popularity contest rather than based on the needs of the ward. Still PB brought the community in and provided opportunities to think creatively beyond road repairs. Ideas were gleaned from the community and included park improvements, lighting, community gardens and sidewalk repairs. Residents also voted on the percentage of the budget to allocate to street resurfacing.

Our current alderman, Jim Gardiner, does not use PB and allocates nearly all money to roadrelated projects with the exception for \$220,000 for a spruced-up alley on the 4200 block of Kilpatrick. It is unclear how resurfacing projects are prioritized as the alderman did not respond to our request for details.

Over the past four years (2019 to 2022), Gardiner had a total of \$4,886,715.77 in menu money. The budget proposed by Arena for 2019 was done in an election

Which Ward Am | In?

The City Council's tug-of-war over ward redistricting ended just before the deadline that would have put the options directly to voters. The GIPNA boundaries have been parsed into different wards. Most of us have been shifted to the 30th Ward. However, if you live in the area bordered by Byron and Irving Park Road and the west side of Central Park Ave., and the east side of Pulaski Road, you remain in the 45th Ward. The exceptions are those residing on the south side of Dakin St. and the apartment building on the west side of Springfield Ave. between Byron St. and Dakin St. which are in the 30th Ward. And if you live on the east side

of Central Park Ave. you are in the 35th Ward. In this case, a picture is worth a thousand words, but trying to get a new map that is legible has been problematic. The new boundaries will go into effect May 2023.

year and was not adopted by Gardiner which was his prerogative. The only exceptions were a few items that may have had contracts approved before Gardiner took office. In the budget years covering 2019 to 2022, few dollars were allocated to streets within the GIPNA boundaries. Of the nearly \$5 million in menu monies, \$75,912 was allocated to resurfacing projects for the 3900 block of N. Lawndale Ave. and the 3900 block of N. Springfield Ave. in 2019. Budgeting is often done a year prior to the budget year and it is unclear whether the resurfacing allocation to our neighborhood was made under Arena's proposed budget that went under

contract before Gardiner was sworn in.

If you want to see a detailed breakdown of how menu monies are allocated, check out the Chicago Office of Management and Budget website: https://www.chicago.gov/city/en/depts/obm.html. In the middle of the page, click on 'Aldermanic Menu Postings.' This is a drop-down menu by year. Note that each annual document covers all wards and is organized by ward number, so you need to scroll to nearly the end (around page 130) to view Ward 45.

The 45th Ward covers hundreds of blocks, many in need of resurfacing. Although a yearly allocation of \$1.5 million per year seems like a lot of money, it certainly is insufficient to meet the demand. Still, it is important to understand how aldermanic discretionary monies are spent given that they come from your tax dollars.

ENVIRONMENT Save GIPNA's Ash: **Round Two**

Calling all tree lovers: Support our existing ash trees and stave off any more tree removals in our neighborhood. In 2020, GIPNA launched a campaign to save our ash trees infected by the Emerald Ash Borer. The campaign was a wonderful success in securing funding to treat 50 ash trees in our neighborhood parkways. The treatments need to be repeated ideally every two years, so we are due for the next treatment this summer. A special fund designated for the ongoing treatment of our ash trees was established in 2020, and while you can donate at any time, we need to once again build up our coffers to support this ongoing effort. The Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) is



an invasive beetle that attacks and slowly kills ash trees. The EAB originated in Asia and was first detected in Illinois in 2006. This tiny but deadly beetle literally sucks the life out of a tree from the inside. The larvae of this green menace bore into a tree and feed under the bark. The infestation results in a slow death for the tree as it can no longer transport needed water and nutrients from the ground. Once a tree is infected by this strangler, death is certain within a two to four-year time period.

The EAB is responsible for the death of millions of ash trees across the U.S. Some estimates are as high as hundreds of millions. There are an estimated 45.000

ash trees left across Chicago. The City had been treating these trees, but due to budget cuts discontinued treatment and instead began cutting them down. In Independence Park, we identified 50 parkway ash trees suitable for treatment and saving and had a very successful response from many of you to help support that treatment. The treatment costs roughly \$150 to \$200 dollars per tree and lasts for two to three years. GIPNA secured a discounted rate for the treatment.

Many of you passionately care about our trees and want to protect them. This is further

evidenced by our momentous planting of new trees in cooperation with the Openlands organization over the past few years. Many thanks to our neighbor Lorraine Antieau for coordinating our partnership with Openlands. Trees are a vital part of what makes this neighborhood beautiful. Additionally, the benefits of trees are immeasurable including improved water quality, wildlife protection, and a cooling effect which helps lower energy bills. Mature trees add an average of 10 percent to a home's property value. In case this was not convincing enough, your donation to the GIPNA 501(c)3 fund is tax deductible.



Welcome to the warmth of spring, summer and fall. With the greening and blossoming of the seasons comes the joy of being outside. Nothing could be more iconic for doing that than our neighborhood block parties.

Everyone at the inaugural block party held in the 3800 block of Lawndale Ave. on June 4 pointed me to Christopher Rose as the person most responsible for the fabulous decorations of blue and yellow in honor of Ukraine and sumptuous tables (decorated with chandeliers) of food and his special punches, so I asked him all about it. "We wanted to do something at the very beginning of the summer, like a summer kick-off, and we also didn't want to compete with the other block parties. Plus, it was nice and cool, too." Chris didn't want to take all the credit, even though everyone around said he deserved it: "Jennifer Pembroke started it off with me and of course Britany Styles, Jody and Julie Fernandez helped with everything, too."

I spent a few hours enjoying some fried chicken, a la Mary Ann Karwowski, had some of Chris' yummy, cherry-lemon punch, chatted with my Lawndale-andbeyond neighbors, and sipped a bit of wine, too. Thanks, Bobbie and Jim. In the background, the kids were delighted to jump to their heart's delight in the Jumpy House, and some folks competed for the corn hole trophy. Chris arranged to collect funds to cover expenses with a glass jar and electronic donating.

There are long-standing block parties in the neighborhood as well. Holly Van Essen was happy to share a bit about the Dakin block part. Usually held on the 3rd or 4th weekend in July, this year it's scheduled for July 30. "The big draw for the kids is just the freedom the street closure brings; they can run and ride bikes, scooters and skateboards without the worry of traffic. We always order a Jumpy House from the city as soon as they start taking orders so that we're sure to get one. We also request our Block Party permit from our alderman. In the past we've shared a roast pig or tamales and rice, and had a band as well, but last year we all cooked different meats and assembled tacos together. Beverages are BYOB. There are scavenger hunts, relay races and a water balloon toss. We cap off the evening with a raucous game of Capture the Flag."

My block, the 3800 block of Ridgeway, has a long-standing block party, too. There have been different iterations of it over the years. At one point it grew to be Ridgeway Fest with a banner over the street, pony rides, roasted pigs, a dunk tank and even the Jesse White Tumblers, but always at its core has been the focus on the kids. In recent years, we've blended old school with some things that were added during the Fest days. It's usually held the 2nd Saturday in September; September 10th this year. You're likely to enjoy kid's races, piñatas, shared dishes, grilled burgers and

dogs, a cake walk with prizes for the best cake, Jumpy Houses (that we've rented ourselves because the city program only operates when school is out), bonfires, s'mores and lots and lots of laughter and FUN. There's a committee of organizers and most everyone volunteers for something during the day. There's a charge of \$30 per family or \$10 per person. Beverages are BYOB.

The last block party of the season is held the 3rd or 4th weekend in September in the 3600 block of St. Louis. I chatted with Bernardo Bello while he took a few minutes from his volunteering at the retirement party honoring Dr. Christine Zelenka from our very own Murphy Elementary on June 3rd.

Bernardo said, "Everyone pretty much cooks their own food and of course we have a Jumpy House." When pressed about what he thought was the favorite activity of the day, he said, "Oh, we have a donut eating contest. Donuts are hung on strings and contestants try to eat it all with their hands behind their backs. There are no prizes, just bragging rights. It's fun to watch and the glazed donuts are from Krispy Kreme!" I think I just might try to enter that contest this year!

"Back in the day, Avers had some great block parties when



our kids were small," Roberta and Ken Wilk told me. "We even had a band; it was lots of fun." Last year the 3700 and 3900 blocks of Lawndale tried out block parties; we'll watch to see if they come back out again this year. Everyone l've partied with or spoke with about block parties have always sung the benefits of hosting one — getting to know our neighbors better, camaraderie, joy and the best of all, the lasting memories for kids and adults alike.

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
