Our little library was developed out of the desire to honor the memory of my mother and her passion for reading. I had the wonderful experience of having my mother, Ann, live with us for the last two years of her life. She was constantly reading. She always said she "Could travel the world by opening up a book and losing



herself in the experiences. You can travel back in time or go to places you would never be able to go." My husband Michael and I built the house out of love. He would give her a book every birthday and holiday.

My mother read so many different kinds of books; some rooted in real life stories and some for education. She was very fascinated by counseling and anything related to human behavior. She actually went back to school and got her master's degree at age 70

in Psychotherapy. She worked for several years as a counselor.


When we cleaned out her house, we brought a lot of the books here to populate her little library and we donated a lot of her therapy books to the Heartland Institute in Arlington Heights. Along with books, I have used ours to also pass along some music and movies and a few bookmarks.

There are at least 10 little libraries within a two-mile radius of Irving Park Road and Elston. So I hope you get a chance to take a look and see if there is anything you would like to read. And if

you have books you want to pass along, please feel free to leave them for someone else to enjoy.

# Support Grassroots Democracy: Participate in Local School Councils (LSCs)

In the city of Chicago, Local School Councils (LSCs) serve as a governing body for each districtmanaged school in the Chicago Public School (CPS) system.

# Local School Councils are responsible for:

- Approving the school based academic plan (CIWP)
- Approving the alignment of budgetary resources to the CIWP

 Engaging in the annual evaluation of contract principal's professional practices

Selecting or renewing contract principals

Comprised of parents, community, educational, and student members, LSCs serve as an important vehicle for participatory democracy, providing a wide variety of stakeholders an opportunity to make important decisions about how students in their communities will be educated.

The upcoming Local School Council elections are in April. Consider running for the LSC as either a parent of a child in the school or as a community representative. If you are not yet ready for elected office, take time to read up on the candidates, attend the candidate forum and vote. CPS is also seeking election judges. Judges are paid \$250 PER DAY worked and are required to attend a two hour unpaid training session. # Does Litter Drive You Crazy Too?

Who do you contact to get litter cleaned up? Here's a list of some resources:

Private business or residence: For businesses or private residences with excessive trash, including on their parking lot, parkway, yard, sidewalk, etc., try calling or emailing the owner first to politely ask them to clean up their trash. If they don't do anything, you can report them for a Sanitation Code Violation through 311. The city will visit and issue a warning fairly quickly. It is the owner's responsibility to keep their property and parkway clean. The link is: https://311.chicago.gov/s/article/ sanitation-code-violations.

Highway areas: IDOT (Illinois Department of Transportation) is

responsible for green spaces next to ramps, fenced-in areas next to the highway, and fenced-in areas under overpasses. You can reach out to IDOT through their website to report a trash problem at this link: https://apps.dot.illinois.gov/WER/?from=. It may take them a while depending upon the time of the year. You should receive confirmation in about 3-4 weeks that the area was cleaned.

The City of Chicago ward offices are responsible for all other areas near highways, such as nonfenced sections under overpasses and the sidewalks nearby. # Is Your Lawn Safe for Your Kids and Pets?

Spring is on its way and with it
comes lawn care companies, many
of whom use pesticides and toxic
chemicals to try and beautify your
lawn. The truth is you don't need
anything dangerous on your lawn
to make it beautiful. When you
use dangerous chemicals on your
lawn, it's affecting your neighbors
next door, your neighbors down
the block, your community's water
system. On and on.

There are many reasons to care about using pesticides and herbicides. The most critical reason for you might be how it affects your children and your pets.

# How Do Pesticides Affect Our Children?

Pound for pound, children have much higher exposures to pesticides than adults do, just through normal daily activity. What's especially frightening is how vulnerable children's brains

are to pesticides during fetal and early childhood development. Researchers are learning that children's developmental processes are easily disrupted by small amounts of toxic chemicals; amounts that would be virtually harmless for adults.

# Why Are Pesticides So Toxic to Children?

The National Pesticide Information Center (NPIC) lists many reasons why pesticides are more toxic to children:

- An infant's brain, nervous system, and organs are still developing after birth.
- A baby's immature liver and kidneys cannot remove pesticides from the body as well as an adult's liver and kidneys.
- Infants take more breaths per minute and have more skin surface relative to their body weight.
- Children often spend more time closer to the ground, touching baseboards and lawns where pesticides may have been applied.
- Children often eat and drink more relative to their body

- weight than adults. This can lead to a higher dose of pesticide residue per pound of body weight.
- Babies crawl on treated lawns and carpeting. Crawling may dislodge pesticide residue onto a baby's skin. The baby also breathes in pesticide-laden dust.
- Young children are also more likely to put their fingers, toys, and other objects into their mouths.

#### **How Pesticides Affect Our Dogs**

Dogs live in the yard much differently than we do. You and I sitting on the back patio is not the same as our dog rolling around in the grass. That's why dogs are at a greater risk (and kids, too). A higher risk of bladder cancer for dogs is one example of how dogs are affected by lawn chemicals.

Chemicals are commonly detected in grass residues from both treated lawns and untreated

lawns suggesting chemical drift from nearby treated areas. As a result, dogs can be exposed to chemicals through contact with their own lawn (treated or contaminated through drift) or through contact with other grassy areas on their walks.

#### Find Out What Your Landscaper Is Using on Your Lawn

If you don't know what your landscaper uses on your lawn, it's okay to ask. Take a photo of the label your landscaper provides you or ask for a safety data sheet for their products. If you need help understanding what's on the label—email me (robyn@ iamgreenwise.com) an image or the product name and I can get answers for you.

An organic approach to lawn care will give you that beautiful lawn, and, more importantly, it will be 100% safe! That's a good thing for you, your children and pets, your neighbors, and our environment!

### Get the Lead Out

If your home was built before 1986, you likely have lead pipes that carry your water into the house. Not all pipes leach lead into the water supply, but the city is offering free testing to determine whether your drinking water is contaminated. Follow the instructions in this link https://www.chicagowaterquality.org/home#how and click on the 'How Testing Works' at the top of the page to

order an in-home test kit. If you don't want to order online, you can also call 311 to request a kit. Once you collect the samples, mail it in and you will receive a lead analysis. You also have the option to schedule an appointment for someone to come to your house to collect the sample. If you decide that pipe replacement is needed, the city won't pay to install them, but it will waive the permit fee. The Build Back Better bill does allocate money to replace lead pipes, but counting on this source anytime soon may be a pipe dream.

#### ► Don't Self-Evict

If you get an eviction notice, know that only the Cook County Sheriff's Office can carry out an eviction. It is illegal for your landlord to try to remove you from your home.

Rentervention is a free and confidential service through Lawyer's Committee for Better Housing Get your legal housing questions answered and get connected to more resources.

# Exploring the World Through Books with the Help of a Book Club

There is only so much Netflix binging I can do before feeling like a blob and wondering what happened to my day or night, or in some cases, both. The same is true with doom scrolling given the events of the past year. My balm has been books and my book club.

Books can give an in-depth look at historical and current events, social and cultural norms. Books can transport you into another country, another time period and transform your views on a topic. Books can nourish your soul and who can't benefit

from that?

If you need motivation to read novels, then join or start a book club. Nearly 28 years ago, my sister, Ellen, and I started a book club with nine other friends. Some of the names and faces have changed as people have moved, but eight of us have been together since April 1994. And Maggie, the newbie, joined in 2002. When we started, only one person had children and now there are 23 kids among us - actually all but two are now adults. The passage of time comes sharply into focus with that fact.

On the last Tuesday of each month, we gather, except in December when we carol or bake cookies. Our book club is rather informal with no designated leader and no structured format. We have kept the size to 11 knowing that not everyone makes it every month. We take turns hosting and serving treats. Our rigorous book selection process consists of tossing out the question "Does anyone have a suggestion for next month?"


We have a few guidelines: books generally have to be available at the library and should not exceed 500 pages. We tend to read more contemporary fiction, but nonfiction memoirs and biographies make the list as do a fair share of classics which are always available at the library.

Our books have taken us to every continent, spanned centuries, and crossed empires. Plots have taken place in the Chinese countryside during the 70s (Life), the French resistance movement in the 40s (Nightingale), the swamps of North Carolina (Where the Crawdad Sings) and Algeria during a plague (The Plague). The most recent books, American Dirt and Behold the Dreamers, have opened my eyes to those trying to migrate to the U.S. after fleeing desperate situations in their countries.

I would like to think that books have made me more empathic as I see the world through the eyes of another. Life's tough issues are not always black and white. Fleshing out the gray areas forces me to examine complex situations where characters have to choose the least awful choice. My moral compass is challenged when a mom steals food in order to feed her kids. Some books that were hardest to get through were also the most memorable.

As anyone in a book club knows, it isn't just books that get discussed. Kids, jobs, spouses, travel, politics, city life, entertainment are sprinkled throughout the conversation. Over the years, we have been through health scares, childrearing woes, schooling dilemmas, job losses, and deaths of our parents. The themes in books often are played out in our lives. I am grateful that my friends are thoughtful, aren't afraid to voice a contrary opinion and always have illuminating insights.







Have you been missing live theater or are you just sick of being stuck at home and in need of a little excitement? If so, you're in luck because our nearby gem of a theater, Windy City Playhouse, is excited to announce its return to live theater with two new productions. The world premiere of SONS OF HOLLYWOOD opened at the flagship location, 3014 W. Irving Park Road, on January 26th and runs through April 16th. Audiences will find themselves transported back to the Golden Age of the film industry. The production is inspired by the remarkable true stories of the gay silent film stars William ("Billy") Haines and Ramon Navarro along with their dear friend Joan Crawford. In 1925, Billy and Ramon were at the

Their second current production, A Recipe for Disaster, is an immersive theater experience and has been described by the Chicago Tribune as a farce designed for fun. ### Michael Ruiz Listened to His Mom

I always tell my kids, "Listen to your mom!" Let's see what happened when Michael Ruiz did just that.

Michael, 23 years old, was born and raised on Ridgeway Avenue along with an older brother and a younger sister. He went to Blaine Elementary for grade school. He attended high school at Notre Dame and graduated from DePaul University with a degree in Developmental Psychology in May 2020.


Michael worked at a few restaurants while at DePaul and post-graduation. With COVID still raging in March of 2021, Murphy School was open but had smaller classroom sizes. Michael's mom Delphine, a CPS employee, told him that Murphy needed responsible adults in the classrooms to assist the overwhelmed teachers who were teaching in the classroom and over Zoom. She suggested that he apply for a position. Michael did so and was hired to spend his time keeping an eye on the kids and performing miscellaneous tasks.

His role evolved to a Special Education Classroom Assistant in August 2021. He is now paired with second grade students with behavioral, emotional and social needs. He works with them to recognize their needs and learn how to express them in a healthy manner. He is gratified to see the

positive impact his work has had on the students. In light of how their education was so disrupted by COVID, Michael is so happy to see how much they have progressed.

Michael has had several other jobs, but this one is, hands down, the single most educational job he has ever had. Michael LOVES what he does and loves Murphy. This is ironic because, up to the time he started at Murphy, he didn't know anything about the school and had never stepped inside it even though it was about a block away from his home. The principal, Dr. Zelenka, and vice-principal, Dr. Shick, are the two most wonderful bosses with whom he has had the pleasure to work. He and the teachers are very much a team. He's been in tight-knit work groups before, but has never experienced this cohesiveness anywhere before.

Michael plans to work at Murphy for the next couple of years. Unfortunately for Michael, he no longer has the "best commute" since he has moved to Noble Square. As a kid in grammar school, Michael often stopped by the counselor's office to talk about various issues in his life. That memory, along with this fulfilling experience of working with these high needs kids, has spurred him on to think about graduate work in counseling. He is contemplating counseling either in or out of schools or even, at some point, teaching. He has already been accepted into a counseling graduate program. And all (or at least partially) due to him listening to his mom.

And seek the ground you have always known.



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# Last Call to Sign Up for Free Parkway Trees!

One thing that greatly enhances life in our neighborhood is our beautiful trees. If you've ever walked down our tree-lined streets on a sunny summer day, enjoying the rustling green leaves and the cooling shade they provide, you know what I mean! That is why GIPNA works actively with Openlands, an organization dedicated to connecting Chicagoans to nature. As one of their many programs, Openlands offers neighborhoods in the Chicago area grants and support to increase the number of trees on their streets. In 2020, Openlands, through a grant to GIPNA, planted 21 free native trees in parkways in our neighborhood.

We applied for a new grant in 2021, and our application was approved, but because of COVID, neighborhood plantings were backed up, and GIPNA was too far down the list for a planting date in 2021. In late January, we were informed that we've moved to the top of their list for a planting day in 2022 and more recently we received notice that GIPNA is on the schedule for a planting day this spring!



Beyond beautifying our neighborhood, trees provide a variety of environmental benefits, and have also been shown to increase property values. You are invited to apply as a volunteer to receive a free native parkway tree. Openlands will survey the parkway at each address ahead of time for suitability of space and species of tree. Openlands staff, along with neighborhood volunteers, will plant the trees on a day to be determined, possibly in early April, rain or shine. Recipient volunteers agree to water and mulch the young tree for at least 3 years, getting them off to a healthy start. The deadline for applying to receive a tree is March 10, so time is short! Please email me at GIPNAtrees@gmail.com right away if you are interested.
