New Food Options Spring Up in IP



Springtime brings blooming flowers, budding trees...and two new dining opportunities in the community. This spring Independence Park neighbors can partake of a couple of very different but equally exciting menus.

Fittingly Delicious is coming to 3939 West Irving Park Road, the former Al Dente Restaurant space, in late March. Its website, fittinglydelicious.com, says the company grew out of a meal prep company created by athletes, trainers, health geeks, and foodies who were brought together by their love of fitness and bodybuilding. The principals saw that while their friends and clients worked out and were physically active, they didn't necessarily know what to eat or how to prepare it, and were frustrated by busy lifestyles and lack of training.

Fittingly Delicious offers prepared meals personalized to fit individual fitness goals such as weight loss or general fitness. The meals are promised to be "natural, delicious, nutritious, additive- and preservative-free, mostly gluten-free, have no added sugar, and focus on non-inflammatory foods."

Fittingly Delicious says its meals

are appropriate for athletes, competitors, and anybody who needs a healthy, tasty weekly food plan. It plans to offer online ordering on a specific schedule for either pick-up or delivery. Check the website for more information and an announcement of the opening date.



To enjoy a familiar favorite, save room for a slice at **Hearth & Crust Restaurant** in early spring. Started by Independence Park neighbors Eileen and Chepe Garcia, this full-service restaurant at 3608 West Irving Park Road will feature a wood-burning oven for baking its specialty: pizza. The Garcias also own the Zagat-rated Buona Terra in Logan Square, and the Hearth & Crust opening date is planned for the 15th anniversary year of Buona Terra

When Eileen was asked why she and her husband wanted to open a pizza restaurant, the answer was simple: "We love pizza!" Hearth & Crust will also offer contemporary American foods—dishes prepared with a mix of Mediterranean, Latin, and Asian influences for both meat eaters and vegetarians, plus some vegan options. Of course, there will also be a well-stocked bar.

The Garcias hope Hearth & Crust becomes a venue for families, neighbors, and friends. The restaurant initially will be open for dinner seven days a week and will also offer takeout, with the intent of eventually extending to lunch and brunch seatings.

Champion Level Gymnast

Ask Avery Byrd how she got started in the sport that has changed her life, and the answer is simple. "My brother was a gymnast," she says. "I used to watch him flip and swing and it looked like a lot of fun, so I started doing it too. In the beginning, it was really easy—I was just a little kid having fun doing cart-wheels and somersaults."

Times have certainly changed from her somersault days. Avery, now 13 years old, is a champion level 8 gymnast with the Chicago Park District, rising as far as state champ on bars and beam in 2015 and achieving top placements at her first regional competition in 2016. The medals and trophies that fill her bedroom to bursting attest to her success at one of the world's most challenging sports.

Avery began competing at Peterson Park's gymnastic center nearly a decade ago, starting in small "Twinkle Stars" classes and quickly moving to the competitive team. Her first competition, however, didn't go so well. Avery recalls she "saluted to the judges, did my first round-off, missed the flip-flop, and landed flat on my back.

"I cried, but I wasn't hurt—I was only five or so, and it scared me. I placed fifth out of five, and my mom took me for ice cream. After that I left tumbling and started artistic gymnastics, moving up through the levels each year and learning harder and harder skills."

Avery's older brother Gavin was also a competitive gymnast, so there was a drive to succeed both



at the gym and at home from the very earliest days. "My brother and I would mess with each other at practices," Avery says. "We would always compete to see who could learn a skill first. My first flip-flop I ever did was a competition I started with Gavin to see who could do one first. The whole gym was cheering us on, and I ended up beating him and won doughnuts!"

Avery thinks of her friends and coaches at Peterson as family, and the gym as her second home—understandable since she now practices three hours a day, six days a week. "I am closer to my gym family than even my school friends," she says. "My coach Carey is literally a lifesaver; he can catch anything or spot a skill and catch me if I fall.

"When I was little I almost went to Lakeshore Academy because a coach there approached my mom about me, but I am glad I didn't because I wouldn't have met the people I've met. We don't have a lot of fancy equipment like private gyms, but I think it's a good thing because we work that much harder to learn a skill quicker."

Having achieved such a high level of success, the tiny powerhouse hopes to stay in the sport throughout high school and, if she can still manage the skills, even



into college. Avery would recommend gymnastics to any young person looking for an activity: "It keeps me fit, challenges me, takes out my energy, and has taught me how to go for something I am scared of. It gives me confidence and makes me comfortable in my skin—instead of skinny legs,

mine are muscular, and I like being strong.

"Some days I love [training] and some days I hate it because it is so hard, but I've learned to manage a goal step by step. I also love being a part of a team. If my teammates do better than me, I am happy for them." CHARITABLE DONATIONS

The City's 7-Cent Solution to Plastic Pollution

As of February 1, a 7-cent checkout bag tax is being collected on all disposable paper and plastic bags used in Chicago. The city hopes this new bag tax will reduce the number of disposable bags used in Chicago.

There are multiple disposable bag exemptions, including:

- Paper and plastic bags used to package loose bulk items such as fruit, vegetables, nuts, grains, candy, cookies, or small hardware items, or to contain or wrap frozen foods, meat, or fish (prepackaged or fresh).
- Dry cleaning or garment bags, newspaper bags, or bags provided by a pharmacist to contain prescription drugs.
- Bags sold in packages containing multiple bags intended for use as garbage bags, pet waste bags, or yard waste bags.
- Bags provided by a dine-in or take-out restaurant to contain food or drink purchased by the restaurant's customers.

LOCAL ARTIST

Spirit of the Dance

A longtime Independence Park resident has started a dance studio in Logan Square. In January, Deborah Byczkowski opened VOLTA Performing Arts, a studio devoted to dance technique education, creative self-expression, creative movement, and social connections through dance.

Byczkowski, daughter of Central Park block representative Vania Bandelli, sees dance as much more than just executing steps. "We engage student's critical thinking in order to develop a deeper sense of self-awareness," she says. "We aim to have our students discover a deeper understanding of their own structure and how to move efficiently within that frame instead of just trying to imitate a shape."

One of the guiding principles at VOLTA is the integration of anatomy, kinesiology, and physics principles into the dance curriculum. Byczkowski has adopted the Revolutionary Principles of Movement (RPM) philosophy, under which every student receives individual attention to address their unique needs. Progress is measured by individual improvement, rather than comparison to the rest of the class.

Byczkowski holds a teaching



certificate from the American Academy of Ballet and has received three RPM Scholarships. VOLTA has an all-female staff and also features an artistin-residence program. The goal is to ensure students experience and learn beyond the walls of the studio.

"Dance education is about more than proper technique training," says Byczkowski. "It's vital that young dancers engage with the dance community, attend dance concerts, participate in master classes, and attend talk-backs and lectures with professional dance companies, independent artists, dance historians, and other dance professionals."

Classes are offered in creative movement, ballet, tap, jazz, and contemporary and modern dance, geared toward skill levels from toddlers to 18-year-olds. The residency program will offer low-cost rental space and, ideally, generate a cooperative relationship between VOLTA's youth program and professional dance artists in Chicago.

Theft Prevention Tips to Protect Your Car

Good news on crime: The Chicago Police Department reports the number of reported auto thefts in Chicago has declined. CPD credits increased enforcement and a greater awareness by drivers, and offers these common-sense measures to help prevent your auto from being stolen:

- Always try to park in well-lit, heavily traveled areas as close to your destination as possible.
- When you park, always roll the windows up tight, lock all doors, and take your keys/key fob with you.
- Never leave your car with the motor running, even if only for a minute to run into a store or your home.
- Never hide spare keys in a secret place or in a magnetic key box under the hood. Car thieves routinely check the visors and ash trays, and look under the floor mats.
- Some thieves use tow trucks to take cars. To avoid being towed by a thief, turn your wheels toward the curb and apply your emergency brake.
- If you have a garage, use it. Lock both your car and the garage.
- Don't leave your automatic garage door opener in your car—it's easier for a thief who enters your garage through the side door and breaks into your car to get the vehicle out.

- Check periodically to ensure that your vehicle identification number (VIN) is intact. This is a small metal plate, usually by the driver's side, where the dashboard and windshield meet.
- If you see someone tampering with your vehicle, use discretion about approaching the person. He or she may be armed. Instead, call 9-1-1 and inform the call taker that you are reporting an auto theft "in progress."
- If you're selling a vehicle, don't let a stranger take it for a test drive alone. If a prospective buyer wants to take the car to a mechanic for an appraisal, volunteer to deliver and pick up the car.
- When buying a used car, be certain that the seller's name and address are verified, and be sure that VIN on the registration card is the same as the one on the car.

And if your car is stolen...

- Keep your vehicle's title at home, not in the glove compartment of your car. This will prevent a thief from using the title to "prove" he owns the car.
- Consider etching your VIN into all car windows, T-tops, and other expensive removable parts. This will help the police identify stolen auto parts.
- Carry a card listing your license plate number, VIN, engine type, and body style. Relay this information to the police quickly if your car is stolen.


