Putting Down Roots in Independence Park

Al De Reu has lived in the neighborhood for almost ten years. He moved from Avondale, where he lived for eight years. Now Al has lived here longer than anywhere else in his life, and he's in no hurry to leave. He says the combination of walkability, access to public transportation and good parks and forests, and active, engaged citizens make for a great allaround neighborhood.

Al is a Certified Arborist and for 3-1/2 years has been the TreeKeepers Program Manager for Openlands, a non-profit conservation organization. Openlands has partnered with GIPNA and the Independence Park Advisory Council (IPAC) for tree plantings in recent years in Independence Park. Before taking his current position, Al edited math textbooks for more than 12 years, but working outdoors with trees and educating people about trees and their benefits was more what he really wanted to do. He took the TreeKeepers course in 2010 and volunteered at numerous restoration and "green" events in order to transition from education publishing to a more environmentally focused career.

In fact, volunteering is a big part of Al's life. He can reliably be found working at the annual Wine and Cheese party and Gourmet Pancake Breakfast events for GIPNA, as well as the occasional shift at the farmers market. He leads tree walks in the neighborhood (and elsewhere) several times a year. He is also a dedicated volunteer for CHIRP radio, a local, volunteer-driven station based in North Center. Al also has volunteered with Friends of the Chicago River and Centennial Volunteer; he helps clean parks, remove invasive species from forest preserves, and plant native species.

Now, his focus is on training new TreeKeepers to help take care of Chicago's urban forests. 

News from the Irving Park Food Pantry

FDC Provides Major Grant: The Irving Park Community Food Pantry was awarded a grant of \$33,000 for 2020 from the FDC Foundation. The organization is a long-time supporter of the Pantry, and its grant extends funding for the Pantry's "Fresh Foods for Better Health" effort and the Client Resources Coordinator position. The Pantry thanks grant writer Cathy Foster for her work on the documentation and bookkeeper Lisa Albrecht, treasurer Steve Slaber, office manager Gayle Christensen, and volunteer Gloria Price for their help in preparing the grant.

Voter Registration: The Pantry is offering voter registration in conjunction with ILVOTE, a certified civic organization. Registration is available to any qualified Illinois resident, including clients, volunteers and neighbors. To qualify, you must be a U.S. Citizen at least 17 years old on or before March 17 (the day of the primary election) and 18 years old by November 3 (the general election); you must live in your precinct for 30 days prior to the election, and you cannot be in jail. Members of several groups, including Indivisible Oak Park and League of Women Voters, will work as registrants. They will offer registration and provide mail-in ballots, sending reminders to return the ballots.

Trivia Night March 21: The Pantry's first annual Trivia Night fundraiser is scheduled for March 21. It will be held at Irving Park Lutheran Church's gym at 4057 N Harding. Doors will open at 6:30 p.m., and the competition begins at 7 p.m. Tickets are \$200 for a table of eight in advance or \$30 for individuals at the door. NEW BUSINESS

A Picture-Perfect Addition to Independence Park

Stola Contemporary Art opened a gallery at 3738 W. Irving Park Road in early November. James O. Stola, attorney and gallery owner, moved from the Bridgeport Art Center to our neighborhood because Independence Park has the demographics and affordable rents he was looking for.

Stola Gallery offers an exhibit space for political art, themerelated art, and art by local artists. The gallery represents Kelly Mathews, Karl Emanual, Peter Mars, Brian Bonebrake, Mike Kranz, and Ken Hirte. Stola Gallery intends to mount 10 to 12 shows a year, with each show lasting three or four weeks. Be sure to stop by on the second Saturday each month from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. for the current show's opening. Frequently, there will be live music in addition to wine and snacks.

James Stola's father was a ceramicist who made custom oval pieces that were mounted on tombstones. Stola and his brother grew up around arts and artists, and he has been an avid art collector for years, with a special interest in African art. He has given tours at the Field Museum and has done anthropological research there for 20 years, working directly with the curators. He also is on the board for the American Research Center in Egypt, based at the Oriental Institute in Chicago.

Stola owned Gallery 2828 on Milwaukee Avenue from the 1990s to the early 2000s. He and a partner, Tony Izzo, eventually changed the name to Stolizzo Gallery and continued in business for a number of years. In addition to the art business, Mr. Stola provided legal guidance in overseeing the conversion of an old corset factory at 2989 N. Pulaski Avenue into the Aspira School. He describes himself as an all-purpose attorney who specializes in real estate and immigration issues.

Kelly Mathews is the gallery director and an activist artist. Kelly graduated from the Kansas City Art Institute but took a step back for 25 years to train Arabian horses while making art for fun. In 2014 she returned to art full-time, and her art is definitely political. Her large-scale work is in encaustic (using hot wax and pigment burned as an inlay in painting and ceramics) with an emphasis on image and text. She has a painting called "Dead from the Neck Up" presently in "Girls Will Be Girls," an invitational show at the University of Texas. She also has two pieces in a Women's Caucus for the Arts show at the Bridgeport Art Center.

Stola Gallery wants to become a part of the neighborhood. Kelly points out that the space is available for workshops, wine and paint parties, children's art classes (private and group), plays, speakers, book clubs, figure drawing workshops, or whatever you need a lovely open space for. It also offers full-service professional framing, courtesy of Karl Emanuel, a framing master for more than 25 years. "Whether you need a frame, mat, glass, custom wood panels or a canvas stretched," Kelly says, "Karl is the man you should see."

RECYCLING

CRC Wants New Report on Chicago Recycling

The Chicago Recycling Commission (CRC) is asking for an updated report on Chicago's Blue Cart Program. The last report was completed in 2010 with data from 2007. and the CRC notes that population density and consumer shopping behavior has changed significantly since then.

The CRC would like to benchmark the waste stream. That means identifying and quantifying the type and amount of trash collected, processed, and recycled or landfilled. It also would like to:

 Improve waste and recycling haulers' reporting requirements, improve Chicago's use of the information reported in formulating policy and decisions, and

strengthen the city's commitment to being transparent about what it learns.

- Have the effectiveness of the "managed competition" of the Blue Cart Program reviewed by an independent third party. Mayor Rahm Emmanuel awarded the Blue Cart contract to Waste Management as part of a managed competition strategy, but critics contend the arrangement creates the possibility of conflicts of interest (between trash pickup and recycling processing) and of inappropriate waste going to landfills.
- Put the recycling contract up for bids, even if the thirdparty review recommends that managed competition should remain in place. The CRC asks that request for bids include clear criteria for bidding and the terms of competition, in order to ensure public health benefits are weighted above strictly financial concerns.

- Vigorously enforce the Chicago Recycling Ordinance. It requires all buildings in Chicago to implement recycling programs and establishes fines for non-compliance. It does not, however, establish standards of effectiveness or require transparent reporting from waste and recycling haulers.
- Re-establish Chicago's Department of the Environment and transfer oversight and operation of the city's recycling programs—including all educational activities—to the DOE.

The CRC has been dissatisfied with the City of Chicago's recycling programs since the "notoriously ineffective" Blue Bag Program of 1995 to 2008. It considers the current Blue Cart Program, which was piloted in 2005 and rolled out citywide in 2011, another failure. It has concerns about whether Waste Management properly disposes of the waste it collects and properly charges the city for its services.



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COMMUNITY SPIRIT

Use Nice Ice Baby!

As the snow continues to fall this winter, it's great that neighbors are shoveling and salting their sidewalks to make sure it's safe for us to walk on them. However, the type of salt being used by many of us is harmful to the dogs that walk on these same sidewalks several times a day.

Salt can get lodged in between a dog's pads where it can heat up to around 170 degrees! That's hot enough to cause burns. And the pain will cause the dogs to lick their paws, which adds more moisture to their feet...and now the salt is on his lips and tongue too.

There are salt products out on the market that are safer for dogs and can still melt away the ice. Look for products that claim to be "safe for pets. Our course, always check the back label for any warnings. If it's not safe for children, it won't be safe for pets either.

Thanks for making it safer for all of us to walk in the neighborhood.

GREEN KNOWLEDGE

A Patch of Butterfly and Bird Heaven

Three years ago, Katie and Lawrence Miller moved into their Independence Park home. Katie and her husband had lived in an apartment building in Wrigleyville for 15 years. Before moving to Chicago, though, she had spent five years in Jackson Hole, Wyo. Now, with a yard for the first time in decades, she yearned to reconnect with nature. The new house and yard inspired a gardening itch that needed a good scratch, and Katie began with a small patch near her front yard.

She quickly learned what plants don't work in a shady location. Deciding she needed more information, Katie researched native plants and found prairie flora that will work in our clay-heavy soil. She learned which plants love the sun or the shade, learned which love wet or dry conditions, and learned about pollinators. She also went to the Farmers Market Garden Center, where she was guided to native plants that lived and flourished surprisingly well in our urban environment. After planting some Common Milkweed seeds the following spring, Katie checked the leaves of the seedings and found 14 tiny Monarch caterpillars chomping away on their "host plant." (Milkweed leaves are the only food Monarch caterpillars can eat.) She has been sharing milkweed stories and caterpillars with neighbors ever since.

To learn even more, Katie started volunteering with the North Branch Restoration Project (NBRP). This organization, started in 1977, works to restore native ecosystems in the Cook County Forest Preserves, from LaBagh Woods to Somme Woods. The NBRP conserves the region's natural history by collecting native prairie plant seeds and spreading them in forest preserves. The program, which is run by staff ecologists, was the first in the nation and is a model for the rest of the country. Katie has volunteered more than 150 hours with the NBRP since 2017. She was so intrigued by what she was learning that she enrolled in Northeastern Illinois University's **Environmental Studies program** and will graduate this May.

About two years ago, Katie decided to tackle a sunny area in the neighborhood that, while





covered in non-native turf grass, hid clay and construction rubble from Kennedy Expressway backfill. Katie's neighbors, GIPNA volunteers, Sow Chicago, and her husband and daughter helped create the new "Prairie Patch Pollinator Garden." Katie purchased more native plants and seeds, and friends and neighbors donated cuttings from their own gardens, such as Black-Eyed Susans and asters. A native garden typically takes three to five years to establish itself, so Katie has been very pleased with her garden's continued progress.

Last year, she began growing threatened and endangered plant species for the NBRP, from the genetic offspring of those seeds collected from the now-disappeared Cook County prairies back in 1977. These special plants live among the Prairie Patch, and the seed collected from these plants are harvested and returned to the Forest Preserves. To date she had documented 255 species of flora and fauna in her garden! This is all the more surprising because the garden is hard by the expressway. Today her 25-x-16-foot Prairie Patch is a mosaic of native habitat that will be good for the local air,

soil, people, and wildlife.

After graduation, Katie hopes to work full-time in conservation of natural areas. She wants to help protect and conserve ecological systems in general, especially those in urban ecosystems where they can have the biggest impact on people. Katie is a member of the Chicago Ornithological Society, the Illinois Native Plant Society, the Illinois Butterfly Monitoring Network, and is in the apprentice stewardship program for the Forest Preserves of Cook County.

And she's a very green member of our Independence Park family!


