### Tree-Watching in Our Neighborhood

On a gloomy, drippy day in September 2020, amidst the Covid pandemic lockdowns, panics, and controversies, our neighborhood received a wonderful gift through an Openlands Tree Planters Grant: 21 parkway trees were planted in our neighborhood! Almost two years later, I revisited some of those trees and their recipients to check on the growth and experiences of these partnerships between people and trees.

I was one of those lucky recipients, and when I compare the photo from that day to the one here from early August 2022, I am thrilled that my care has facilitated the growth of this sapling from a kind of scraggly bare little stick into a lush and vigorous young tree. Although watering during the growing season takes commitment, the work involved is small compared to the value of knowing I am contributing to the beauty of our neighborhood, increasing the value of my property, and providing a home to a living being whose life is as intricate as my own.

Other tree hosts are similarly positive about the experience of hosting a young tree in their parkway.

Ellen Ryan and Hasnain Jetha previously had a mature maple in their parkway. Ellen says, "I just love my new tree. When the City removed the old tree, I was so bummed, and now every time I walk out my front door, it's like a miracle is happening. It makes me smile just to see it, watching it get taller and the branches filling out with leaves."

Scott Dewey and Patti Kimbel received two trees on their corner property, and while they acknowledge the labor involved in watering the young trees can reach 15 gallons every week, Scott remarked that there is much pleasure in watching the trees grow tall and healthy. While the future is uncertain and they may not be around to see the mature trees, he feels they are investing, not just in their own property, but in our community for generations to come.

Bobbie O'Connor echoed Scott's sentiments, saying theirs is a legacy tree to beautify the neighborhood for years into the future. She and her husband Jim were sad to lose the large tree in their parkway, and now they enjoy sitting on their porch and admiring the new tree. Even though Bobbie says she doesn't have that much of a green thumb, caring for the tree has not been a burden, and she feels if the tree can survive her, it can survive anything.

Our neighborhood received another Openlands Tree Planters Grant during the Spring 2022 planting season, so we will have further updates on our new trees in future editions.

We plan to apply for another Tree Planters Grant in the next year or two, so please let me know if you are interested in receiving a free parkway tree for whatever reason: in hopes of future shade, to beautify your yard, to teach your children or grandchildren to care for the environment, or to leave a legacy for our neighborhood. ## Logan Pause: The Beautiful Game of Soccer

For kids entertaining a career as a professional athlete read on about a "pro" in our own hood, and what it takes to make it in the big leagues.

Logan and Vaneesha Pause live with their three daughters Isla, Noa and Haven on the 3700 block of Lawndale. Born in Raleigh, North Carolina, Logan fell in love with soccer when he was only four. At age 10, he was a ball boy for the University of North Carolina's soccer team. By then, his love for the game had grown to such a deep level that he wanted nothing more than to play for the Tar Heels. As a high school player, Logan was approached by Duke, Stanford, Brown and Wake Forest, but he chose North Carolina. After playing for two and half years, Logan turned pro when he was drafted by the Chicago Fire. Thankfully for Chicago, Logan spent his entire 12-year soccer career with the Fire.

No one rises to that level without tremendous talent, dogged determination, and utmost sacrifice. Incredibly modest, Logan never mentioned that he was inducted into North Carolina's Soccer Hall of Fame! Oh, in 2010, he was the Fire's MVP. And somehow, he neglected to add that he was selected to play on the U.S. National Teams in 2009 and 2010. (Thanks, Google). In 2014, Logan left the field and worked in the Fire's front office. He went on to become the team's head coach. He also coached Orange County SC.


When asked whether someone should consider a career as a professional athlete, Logan has sage advice:

- 1. Do you really love the game?
- 2. Are you willing to sacrifice and put in the hard work?
- 3. Do you have the discipline to prioritize practice over all aspects of your life?
- 4. Will you do everything it takes to be the best player you can be?

Logan acknowledges intangibles such as luck, good fortune, privilege and being in the right place at the right time. Case in point, Logan's college roommate was equally as talented as he was. They both played the same position, and he was recruited by more colleges than Logan. In the end, Logan played professionally, while his friend did not. The scenario could have been reversed if not for the person who recognized Logan's talent.

Soccer has been a huge gift to Logan. He loves the game's creativity and free-flowing nature. He thrived on the competitive aspect of the game and winning. But the friendships he fostered with his teammates, some of whom remain his closest friends, were the highlights. Because of the sport's global appeal, Logan's team resembled the United Nations of soccer. He met people from all over the world. His good friend is now the head coach of Leeds United, an English Premier League team. The sport afforded him travel throughout Europe and Latin America and it exposed him to various cultures, different languages and cuisines from all over the world.

Any downsides? The game is transient, and teammates turned best friends are routinely traded. Injuries are a given with soccer and, like any sport, you're loved when you're on top, but not so much when your game is off. However, on balance, the countless benefits of "the beautiful game" far outweigh the downsides. Logan is forever grateful that the sport was such a big part of his life.

## Lead-Safe **Chicago Program:** Lead Service Line Replacement

If you meet certain criteria regarding income and home ownership, you may be eligible to get the lead pipes in your house replaced by the City at no charge to you. Below is a synopsis of what is involved.

#### What does it take to replace a lead service line?

Replacing a lead service line with a new copper service means running the new line from the water main in the street all the way into the house. There are two ways that can be done. With open trench replacements, a trench is dug from the home through the parkway to install the new service and access the water main. Trenchless construction runs the new service to the main underground, causing less disturbance to the surrounding area. The type of procedure performed will depend on several factors specific to each replacement.

#### **Equity Lead Service Line Replacement Program (LSLR)**
